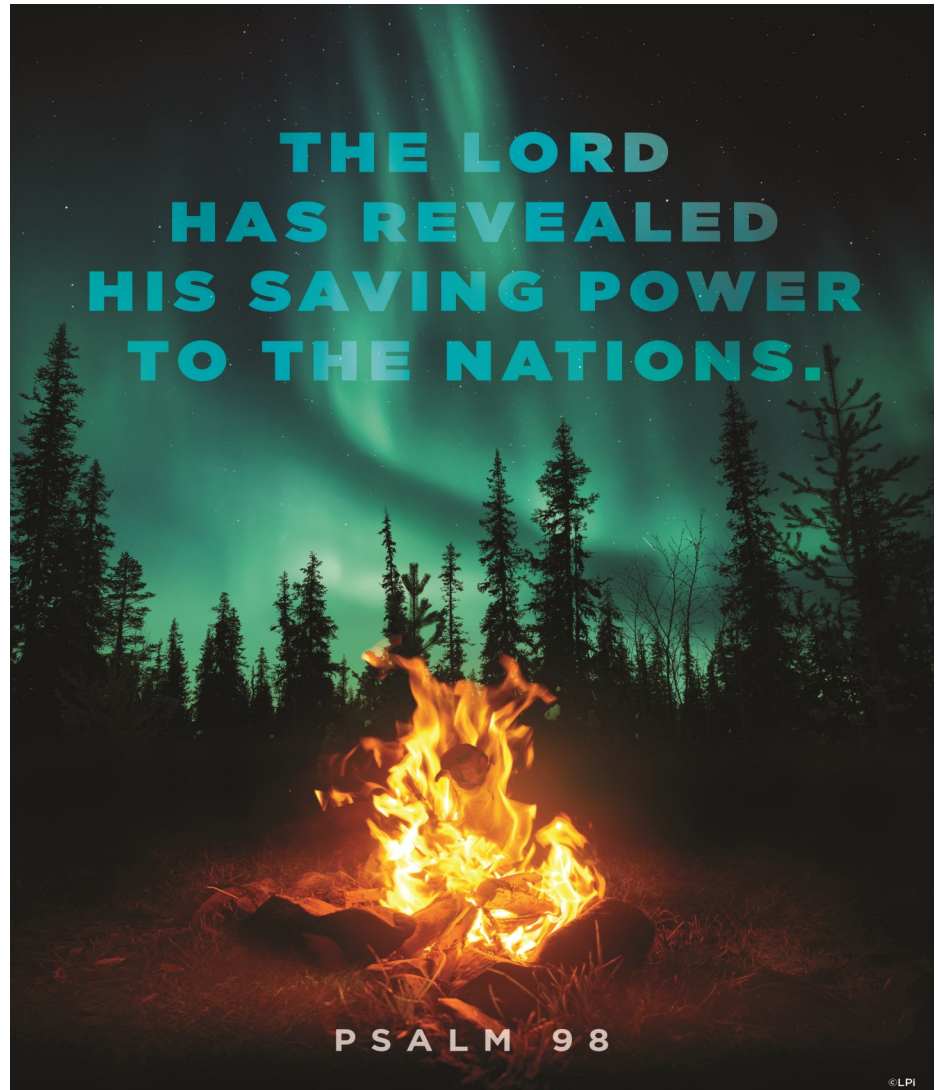

Hello,

This coming week, on Tuesday October 14, the state of Missouri has scheduled to carry out a death sentence on Lance Shockley, unless Governor Kehoe grants him clemency or there is a stay of his execution. Missouri being one of the few states in this country that has both, uses the death sentence, so I thought it would be good to be aware of the Catholic Church's teachings on it and some of the changes in recent history.



In 1992, the first edition of the current Catechism of the Catholic Church was published and paragraph 2267 specifically addressed the death sentence:

“If bloodless means are sufficient to defend human lives against an aggressor and to protect public order and the safety of persons, public authority should limit itself to such means, because they better correspond to the concrete conditions of the common good and are more in conformity to the dignity of the human person.”

When the second edition came out in 1997, one of the only changes made was to the paragraph. In 1995, Pope John Paul II had released the encyclical Evangelium Vitae (The Gospel of Life) and described more explicitly his understanding of the continuing possible needs for such means to protect our society at that time. This resulted in the changes to paragraph 2267 in the Catechism to the following:

“Assuming that the guilty party’s identity and responsibility have been fully determined, the traditional teaching of the Church does not exclude recourse to the death penalty, if this is the only possible way of effectively defending human lives against the unjust aggressor.

If, however, non-lethal means are sufficient to defend and protect people’s safety from the aggressor, authority will limit itself to such means, as these are more in keeping with the concrete conditions of the common good and more in conformity with the dignity of the human person.

Today, in fact, as a consequence of the possibilities which the state has for effectively preventing crime, by rendering one who has committed an offense incapable of doing harm – without definitively taking away from him the possibility of redeeming himself – the cases in which the execution of the offender is an absolute necessity “are very rare, if not practically non-existent.”

While Cardinal Ratzinger (later Pope Benedict XVI) did make statements in 2004 noting differences that could be validly held regarding the death penalty among Catholics, in 2011 (as Pope Benedict XVI) he called for the abolition of the death penalty.

Then, in 2018, Pope Francis further amended paragraph 2267 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church to the following:

“Recourse to the death penalty on the part of legitimate authority, following a fair trial, was long considered an appropriate response to the gravity of certain crimes and an acceptable, albeit extreme, means of safeguarding the common good.”

“Today, however, there is an increasing awareness that the dignity of the person is not lost, even after the commission of very serious crimes. In addition, a new understanding has emerged of the significance of penal sanctions imposed by the state. Lastly, more effective systems of detention have been developed, which ensure the due protection of citizens but, at the same time, do not definitively deprive the guilty of the possibility of redemption.”

“Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that “the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person,” and she works with determination for its abolition worldwide.”

While the wording of the teachings of the Church on the death penalty has changed it has always been consistent in the need for the constant respect for life, whether we are looking at the death penalty, abortion, or euthanasia. May we do all that we can to not only grow in our respect for the gift of life ourselves, but to promote it in our society.

Hello again,

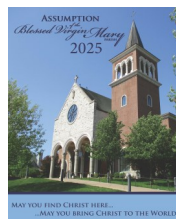

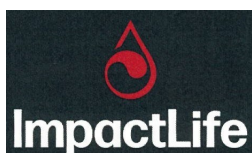

PRINCIPAL'S PEN

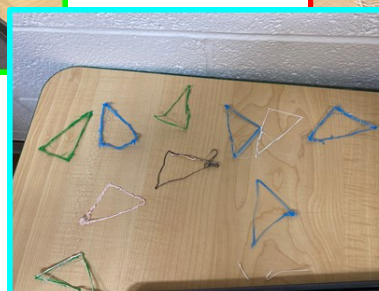
